

STAR QUEST

Grade level: 7

Subject area focus: Language Arts, Technology

Brief Summary:

Students will follow a “star map” of websites to locate information about legendary stars of bluegrass. They will use the information to answer worksheet questions and write paragraphs as directed.

Goals and Objectives:

- Students will use basic computer Internet skills to locate information on websites, gaining knowledge of legendary bluegrass performers.
- Students will demonstrate knowledge of writing skill by properly constructing paragraphs in response to writing prompts on worksheet. They will use a graphic organizer to record the facts for the paragraphs.

Summary of Lesson:

- Assign partners
- Hand out “Star Quest” and “Map of the Stars” (attached)
- Allow 45 minutes for students to locate websites, complete the questions and write using a graphic organizer for the paragraphs.
- Bring the students together to discuss the answers they have found.
- Play music from various bluegrass artists as background while students work.

Evaluation & Assessment:

- Teacher will move among students to make sure they are on task.
- Students will answer question during discussion.
- Teacher will collect and check worksheets.

Follow-up Activities:

- Students will view DVD, *Discover Bluegrass* to deepen their knowledge of legendary bluegrass artists.
- Students may find additional information in *Bluegrass Music Profiles Magazine*, available in class.

Lesson Plan Outline: Star Quest

Objectives: Students will use the Internet to gain basic information about legendary bluegrass performers. They will demonstrate their knowledge by filling out "Star Quest" worksheet.

Materials Used:

Computers with Internet access

Worksheet ("Star Quest")

List of websites ("Map of the Stars")

Copies of various graphic organizers

Prior Knowledge and Experiences/Curriculum Content:

Basic knowledge of computer/Internet use

Experience using graphic organizers

Procedure:

1. Assign partners & give each pair a "Map of the Stars" & "Star Quest" worksheet. Play bluegrass music as background.
2. Allow 45-50 minutes for students to locate information online and complete worksheets, using a graphic organizer to help in writing the paragraphs as assigned.
3. Move among students to assure that they stay on task.

4. Bring class together to discuss information found.
5. Collect, assess and record completed worksheets.

Indicators of success:

Students will

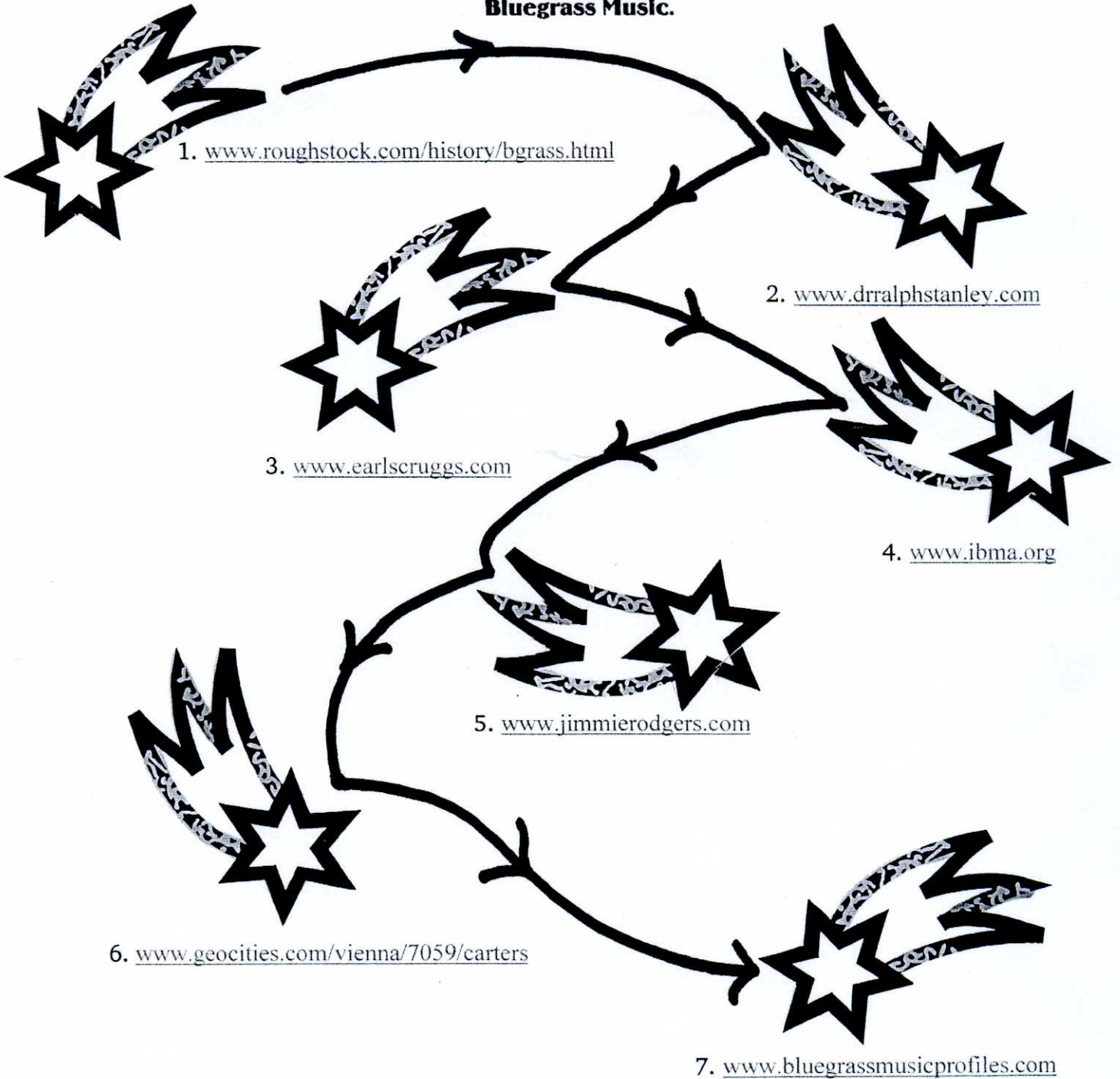
- locate and summarize important information from multiple sources
- organize information
- use correct writing conventions-spelling, punctuation, capitalization, etc.
- select and evaluate information
